1. Degree to be obtained:

This program shall confer a bachelor's degree in law. Students are required to choose subjects from the class subject group for this Program that will give 124 credits, in line with the registration standards.

2. Outline

The Legal Profession Training Course aims to produce and send out into society human resources with a healthy social concern and a specific grounding in the law. To attain this, the program is designed to educate students to develop basic abilities that can be applied in various fields and acquire the foundations of abilities and skills to perform practical work as a legal professional.

In this Program, students will gradually build on their studies as they proceed with an understanding of the meaning of subject groups through Liberal Arts Education subjects in the first year (introduction), become grounded in the basics that lay the foundations for the pursuit of studies through basic specialized subjects in the second year (basics), and acquire the ability to apply skills and practical abilities in an integrated manner through advanced specialized subjects and specialized seminars in the third and fourth years (application and integration). Seeking to graduate early in the third year, students will intensively take law-oriented subjects.

3. Diploma Policies (degree conferment policy and program attainment goals)

In the Legal Profession Training Course, students aim to understand various problems facing the globalized modern society systematically and from a legal point of view, and to acquire the foundations of abilities and skills to perform practical work as a legal professional. As the basis of these aims, students will develop basic abilities that can be applied in various fields, and will become human resources with a healthy social concern and an advanced grounding in the law.

To this end, this Program shall confer a bachelor degree in law on students who have acquired the abilities listed below and obtained the standard number of credits set in the curriculum.

- To be able to discern legal/social problems from a broad perspective;
- To be able to analyze legal/social problems based on a systematic understanding of the legal system; and
- To be able to propose concrete solutions to legal/social problems based on logical thinking.

4. Curriculum Policies (policy for organizing and implementing the curriculum)

The Legal Profession Training Course shall organize and provide curricula based on the following policies to enable students to attain the goals of this Program.

- In the first year, while focusing on Liberal Arts Education subjects, students will also take basic specialized subjects to be introduced to the programs offered by the School of Law.
- In the second year, students will choose a program, solidify the foundations for reaching the goals of this Program by taking mainly law-oriented basic subjects and related subjects and by participating in Preliminary Seminar, and firmly build up their understanding by taking elective/required subjects.
- In the third year, aiming at early graduation, students will participate in specialized seminars and pursue their studies to attain the required abilities prior to admission to the University's Law School.
- In the event of not having graduated early, students in the fourth year will participate in specialized seminars and take related subjects in each field, thereby developing their ability to apply what they have learned to analyzing legal/ social problems and proposing solutions thereto.

• The students' academic performance will be assessed based on 1) evaluations of their respective academic achievements in each subject studied, and 2) their respective achievement level against the goals defined for the educational program.

5. Start of the Program / Admission conditions

Students will register for this Program in the second year. There are no particular requirements regarding the number of credits to be obtained prior to registration.

7. Class subjects and class content

8. Academic achievements

At the end of each semester, evaluation criteria will be shown with a clear indication of attainment standards according to the evaluation items for academic achievements.

Students' academic achievements from admission to the current semester will be indicated as one of three levels: "Excellent," "Very Good," and "Good," based on evaluation criteria calculated by adding weighted values to numerically converted evaluations of their academic achievements (S = 4, A = 3, B = 2, and C = 1) in subjects corresponding to the respective evaluation items.
