

# IGS Graduation Requirements for First-year Students (Course Registration List)

- Courses marked "B" (=Both: English and Japanese) will be counted as "instructed in Japanese"



#### "Experimental Methods and Laboratory Work in Science" Courses

- <u>All students</u> should take at least one of the "Experimental Methods and Laboratory Work in Science" courses. The number of students is limited due to the laboratory size.
- If you are interested in Natural Sciences (Environment and Society): Take both "Experimental Methods and Laboratory Work in Science A" and "Experimental Methods and Laboratory Work in Science B". The number of students is limited due to the laboratory size, but you will have priority.
- For registration for "Experimental Methods and Laboratory Work in Science A" and "Experimental Methods and Laboratory Work in Science B", we need to know which courses you want to take. We will survey your preference through Microsoft Forms.

- Reading academic materials ≠ Reading for pleasure
- What is academic reading?

'Active process that goes beyond merely reading and highlighting your text. You need to interact with the text by taking notes, making connections between the text and what you already know or have experienced, and asking critical questions about the material you are reading.' <u>Academic Reading and Writing | Centre for Teaching and Learning (utoronto.ca)</u>

- Need to learn academic reading skills (e.g., online search, paper structure)
- Research papers published in international journals

#### Special English Training for Studying Abroad

Special English Training for Studying Abroad is provided in Term 2. It is an elective course for students who are interested in studying abroad and want to improve their English abilities to be accepted by universities overseas. In particular, you will learn what **IELTS** is like and work on a lot of examples and exercises, using a textbook. If your TOEIC® score is higher than 800, you do not have to take this course. Please brush up on your English by yourself. This is a course for intermediate students of English. Approval of credits for English communication subjects

- You can receive credit approval depending on your TOEIC score etc. obtained after being enrolled to HU.
- Practical English Proficiency Test (*Eiken*) Pre-1 Grade or above
- TOEFL iBT 68 or above
- TOEIC® L&R 730 or above
- IELTS 5.5 or above

Make sure that you consult your tutor before starting the application process.

# Type 2: Japanese Language Courses

IGS recommends to improve your Japanese skills as high as you can.

That will help you

- communicating with other people
- understanding Japan
- finding a job after graduation (if you want to stay in Japan).

The course level you can take will be decided according to your online placement test score.

- Registration period is from April 1st to 14th.
- You need to submit course registration form to the office of the Morito Institute of Global Higher Education by April 14th. (not on Momiji!).

#### Approval of credits for Japanese Language Courses

Level	Target courses	Number of credits to be granted
N1	Basic Japanese I • II • III • IV	Up to 8
N2	Basic Japanese I • Ⅱ • Ⅲ • Ⅳ	Up to 4

- Check: Handling of Credit Approval for Foreign Language Proficiency Tests, etc. Make sure that you consult your tutor before starting the application process.
- We recommend that you take all 8 credits to improve your Japanese. You can choose courses on a higher level.

- If you have any difficulty in registering subjects, please feel free to ask the IGS Office.
- If you want to study other foreign language(s) such as Chinese, Korean, French, German, Spanish, etc., please consult your tutor and the IGS Office in your second year.

# Type 3

- 8 credits: Non-English foreign language (8 credits)
- The first Non-English foreign language that you will study is decided by Hiroshima University based on your choices.
- The first Non-English foreign language that you will study has already been registered. Access "Momiji" web site to confirm.

# Type 1, 3: Other Foreign Language Courses

- Type 1, Type 3 students: you are already registered for the language you chose (basic and intensive courses)
- If you have not yet registered for an intensive course but would like to do so, please contact the IGS Office immediately.
- If you register for an intensive course, please take the course through all four terms.

The number of students in each course is limited. So if you register but than drop out, you take some other students' chance to study!

#### **Trilingual Program**

#### Chinese, Korean, Spanish, French, German

Eligible Students	As a general rule, registered students for the program, who have basic knowledge of the target language (CEFR: A1)	
Language of Instruction	Japanese and/or the target language	
Semester/Term	From 2 <sup>nd</sup> year to 4 <sup>th</sup> year, 1 <sup>st</sup> to 4 <sup>th</sup> -Term	

1<sup>st</sup> year: Intensive Course (4 classes/week) Notice: language of Instruction is Japanese.

> 2<sup>nd</sup> to 4<sup>th</sup> year: Trilingual Program Registration: Jan 2025

If you want to join the Trilingual Program, you are required to take the Intensive Course in the 1<sup>st</sup> year!

## Information, Health& Sports

#### Information and Data Science Courses 4 credits:

- IGS students will be pre-registered for "Introduction to Information and Data Sciences" (Wed.1~4, Term 2)
- Recommended as 2nd course: "Fundamental Data Science" (in English) or "Starting Programming from Scratch"

#### Health& Sports courses 2 credits:

- Choose one or two Health& Sports courses.
- In T3, Sports Theory and Exercise: Aikido (Code 70060009) will be taught in English
- Those courses indicated in the Liberal Arts Education Time Table will be open to non-Japanese speakers.
- You can take other courses marked J (taught in Japanese) if you speak Japanese.

### Steps to selecting a field

1.Introductory Seminar for First-Year Students: Interviews with IGS faculty

 Term 2: "Invitation to Integrated Global Studies I", Term 3: "Invitation to Integrated Global Studies II": Learn about the three fields.

Learn to associate various global issues and events with the three fields.

### Steps to selecting a field

3. Final Decision on the Selection of a field:

- Consult with both your tutor and a faculty member of your desired field in December. Submit the "Field Request Form" until mid-January.
- The tutor will confirm each student's request by the end of January, and a committee will make the final decision in February.
- The Department aims to have a good balance of the number of students in each field. In the event that many students have a strong interest in one particular field, it is possible that adjustments will be made based on the Field Request Form and student's GPA.

### **IGS Student Ambassador**

- IGS student ambassadors will represent the IGS students.
- Students can voice their ideas, concerns, or opinions regarding the program, school, or daily life to the ambassadors.
- Regular Ambassador Meeting with IGS professors and staff once a semester or whenever necessary.
- The ambassadors plan social events for the IGS students, staff, and professors.
- New ambassadors will start their activities in May each year.
